Investment objective



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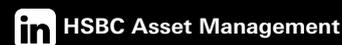
Monthly performance commentary

Portfolio Review

In November, global equities have sustained their positive price momentum from October. As a result, more than half of the losses made in the first three quarters of 2022 have been recouped by global equities in 4Q22 so far. Regionally, the November rally was mainly led by the emerging markets, particularly mainland China. Some favorable announcements made by the authorities in mainland China, such as relaxation of a few COVID-19 related restrictions and support package for the property sector, seemed to have boosted investors' confidence. Nearly all key markets in Europe outperformed the global equity index amid signs of peaking dollar and bond yields. Conversely, equities in the US marginally underperformed. On the back of a US October CPI undershoot and more dovish Fed commentary, a wave of cautious optimism in the developed bond markets was seen in November.

Markets appear to be pricing the peak of the current tightening cycle, with cuts priced in some markets in H2 2023. In China, the possibility of reopening is driving a risk-on rally, meaning bond yields are starting to rise. In the Eurozone the market is hankering for a dovish pivot, further encouraged by the below-consensus CPI data. However, hawkish rhetoric by President Lagarde and other policy makers and an expected rate hike in December pose questions about how much further yields can fall. The FX market in November was dominated by "risk on" momentum – led by signs of bottoming growth data and reports of COVID-19 relaxations in China – as well as a potential Fed "pivot". Despite a hawkish conference delivered by Chair Powell at the 3 November FOMC meeting, the USD was dragged down by generally positive sentiment. Oil prices ended lower with concerns over a global economic slowdown, OPEC+ was considering an output hike and EU discussions about a higher-than-expected cap on Russian oil.

Annually distribution is 1; semi-annually distribution is 2; quarterly distribution is 4; monthly distribution is 12.

The annualised dividend yield is calculated based on the dividend distribution on the relevant date with dividend reinvested, and may be higher or lower than the actual annual dividend yield.

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
